

We ♥ books— in foreign languages

We would like to encourage all students to maintain their home language. Home languages are part of a student's identity and heritage. Fluency and skills in a second language will be a useful tool for the student in life to build connections, understand diversity and expand future career choices. If students at your school have a home language other than English or Irish, you can avail of this funding to purchase books for your school library.

How does your school benefit?

STUDENTS:

Your school can support students' literacy and home language skills by providing material in that language. This can also make them feel included and show that their heritage is valued by all. Students can benefit from the library resources if they sit exams or want to maintain their home language.

TEACHERS:

Your teachers will be able to make use of home language books and other materials, as well as to encourage students to use them.

SCHOOL LIBRARY:

Your school library will be more inclusive, diverse and better able to support all students' home language skills and heritage. This is in line with the Department of Education and Skills National Strategy: Literacy and Numeracy for Learning and Life 2011-2020, which states: 'We must develop the literacy and numeracy skills of all young people.'

SCHOOL:

The scheme is free of charge.











Guidelines for Primary School Library Home Languages Scheme

1. How does it work?

- If you have students who speak languages other than English or Irish, enquire what books or other resources they might want in the school library.
- ✓ Students may also opt for easy readers, magazines, comics, reference books, maps, traditional or digital games, etc. Any resource to assist with activities involving a student's language may, within reason, be covered by the scheme.
- ✓ The Parents' Association or a group of parents might want to help the school to source materials.
- Some links and ideas are provided to assist schools to source books and resources.

2. Checklist for criteria:

- ✓ Your school must be a Department of Education registered primary school.
- Your students would benefit from foreign language books and other resources.
- The library agrees to display a Languages Connect sticker on the books purchased.
- If your school was approved for funding in 2020 or 2019 the maximum funding granted per school is €300.
- The school accepts that it will acquire the books and resources independently and that funding will be provided by reimbursement upon provision of receipts.
- The school agrees to fill in a short evaluation form to give feedback 6 months after the full reimbursement.
- You agree to promote access to these books and resources to all students via their teachers, parents association, and other school communication channels

3. Apply for funding in a few simple steps

Application deadline is 15th March 2021.

Funding applications will be approved as applications come in.

All reimbursement forms need to be returned with receipts by 15th May 2021. Books and other materials can be purchased any time up to that point.
